

Dear Brother Eugene,



# MESSAGE FROM HEAD PREFECT







# REPORT

As in past years, 1973-74 has seen further improvement in both participation and achievement at inter-class and inter -school level. Without doubt this season has been our most successful ever in that at least one of our teams finished within the first three places in every sport we entered. At inter-class level we had competitions for all grades in swimming, cross country, athletics, basketball, table-tennis and football, while we had teams at inter school level in all the above sports except table-tennis (this was because no competition was organised by the HKSSA for that sport). We also entered a C grade team in Badminton. However we did take part in the inter-collegiate table-tennis tournament and also in the inter-Brothers' Schools athletics meet.

The first event on the calendar was the inter-class swimming gala which was held in the Morse Park Swimming Pool early in October. Eleven records were broken during the two days of competition and the meet finished on a fine note when Guest of Honour, Rev. Bro. U Paul, Provincial

Superior, distributed the various trophies and banners and announced a school holiday for the following day.

Following on from the swimming gala the school hall and playground were put to full use for the inter-class table-tennis, basketball and football competitions. At the time of writing only the A Grade competitions are finished while the B and C Grades are down to the final stages. The cooler weather in December saw about three hundred competitors slogging it out around the hill and rough ground behind the school in the annual cross country races. Happily all competitors completed the course but the Red Cross Unit were kept busy tending blistered feet and tired muscles.

The final event on the calendar was the 4th annual athletics meet held at the Mongkok Stadium just before the Chinese New Year holiday. Despite the cold weather a total of fifteen records were broken. Guest of Honour for the occasion was Rev. Bro. Alphonsus, Auxiliary Provincial for Hong Kong.

Our results at inter-school level were very encouraging but there is still plenty of room for improvement. It would be difficult to pick out one team or sport as the best as all did quite well. Our promotion to Division One in athletics was probably our best achievement. Although only second in the overall positions the C grade team were Grade Champions, while A and B were Runners-up. Before the Chinese New Year holidays we entered three teams in the first Christian Brothers Schools athletics meet but the results were not up to expectation. In football the A grade team earned promotion to Division One when they finished second in the league and the B team may be considered for promotion as they finished third in the league for the fourth The C team results were year in a row. not so good as they failed to qualify for the final round of division two and will have to try again next year for promotion. Not to be outdone by the footballers the A grade basketball team also came runnersup in the Kowloon league. B and C results were not up to A grade as the C finished seventh while the B graders had a very bad start to the season and failed to qualify for the final round.

In February three teams travelled to Fanling to take part in the Kowloon cross country competitions and the final points count put the A grade team in 5th place, the B team in third place and the C fourth. In the colony finals, also held in Fanling, the B graders ran fourth. Our success in swimming was more modest than that of other sports due no doubt to the fact that a shortage of public pools in the past gave students little or no opportunity to learn. However the C team managed to come third in division two which was encouraging and now that we have regular use of a training pool at Morse Park we hope for increased interest and better results in the future.

The school table-tennis enthusiasts had to be content with only one major competition this year as the inter-school games fell through when member schools failed to form a committee. The hosts for this year's Inter-Collegiate Competition were St. Joseph's College and after 2 full

days of competition the CSK team emerged in third place. Last, but by no means least, we come to the most junior sport in the school-badminton. We entered a C team in the league for the first time and to everyone's surprise and delight we were runners-up, an excellent result for a first try.

Finally to close this report of the past year I would like to thank all the students who helped make the year as successful as it was, either by participation or by turning up as supporters. Also, of course, thanks are due to our Principal, Bro. Eugene, and members of the staff who gave up time to help coach and support our many interschool teams and also organised and ran the various inter-class competitions. However, we must not be content to rest on our laurels, such as they are, we must look forward to next season and to even better results which will come but only of we are all prepared to get down to regular training with maximum effort - NOW.






### BADMINTON

During practices Alex tends to over-exercise his vocal chords to the detriment of the finer points of the game.





### Our humblest servant-our mightiest ruler.

Have you ever longed to find out the "how" and the "why' of the phenomenon which sometimes is very amusing? On a day when the atmosphere is dry when you take off your pullover, you notice a tiny spark jumping across; when you comb your hair, you notice the hair standing upright near the comb! That is because you are generating 'high tension'. Calculations show that a spark of 1/250 of an inch needs a tension of 200 Volts. So the spark which you made by combing your hair is of high tension — certainly more than 15,000 Volts.

This is the work of the 'Electron'. The electrons are the employees of the Universal Electricity Authority, and are all holders of the world's lightweight championship. According to latest methods of measurement a total of about

slaves, and mightier than kings, for as disunited they are nothing, united they are everything.

Our bodies, the plants and animals, the earth and everything that surrounds us—all are built of countless atoms. But how can we picture these atoms? Leonard De Vries explains the picture of the structure of the atoms and thereby shows how and why the electrons are made to flow:

Each atom is like a solar system in miniature, for as the earth and the other planets circle round the sun, so in the atoms the electrons circle round the nucleus of the atom. The one difference is in the distance, the real solar system is 6,000 million miles across, but the atom is smaller than one 25-millionth of an inch. We ourselves also consist of countless multitudes of such systems. The tip of your nose contains thousands of millions of atoms!

The electrons which are housed in the atom are the bearers of negative electricity. There is also positive electricity which resides in the atom nucleus. The electrons are negative, the nucleus is positively charged; and the normal state of affairs is

that the negative charge of all the electrons in the atom is equal to the positive charge of the nucleus. The result is that both kinds of charge cancel each other out and the atom is electrically neutral.

If this state of affairs is disturbed, for example, when some halfwit gets it into his head to rub his pen against his pullover, a wholesale exodus of electrons follows. They crawl out of the atoms of the wool on to the pen, and then the atoms in question are no longer neutral. The places the electrons have come from have a shortage of electrons and so the positive charges of the nuclei are no longer cancelled out. The result is that the atoms become positive. In the place where the electrons arrive there is a surplus, or excess, of electrons and so the atoms are negative. If they get the chance to return, then they stream in crowds from where there is a surplus to where there is a shortage of electrons, from negative to positive. This stream of electrons is the electric current!

For preference the electrons travel along well-made paths, such as copper wire, which offer the least resistance. They have a dislike for materials such as glass and porcelain because they offer so much resistance that the electrons cannot go through them. Such materials isolate (or insulate) the electrons from the places where they want to go; so they are called insulators. But sometimes, if they try to resist the electrons too much, the electrons stand one behind the other in enormous numbers and, because they are now packed closely together, they can create enough pressure to force a way out for themselves, making a great noise in the process. And this they do with such fiery enthusiasm that their break-through is attended by a spark and a crack; sometimes this develops into a noble display of power, a thunderstorm with lightning and thunder. Generally they prefer to do it calmly and they travel along set paths that have been prepared for them in the form of copper wires. As a rule they begin their journey in a gigantic reel of insulated copper wire which is driven round between the poles of a huge electromagnet, in which other electrons induce a force which is called magnetism. All magnetism is their doing; and so the U.E.A. has a monopoly of this too.

As soon as the electrons have left the coil with the magnet (the dynamo) they run smartly through the copper wire. way they meet a thin, little wire, made from the metal tungsten, inside an airless glass Then they press with so much balloon. force to try to get through it, and there is such a crush of them that they bring the atoms of the little wire into violent motion which makes the wire hot. Some of the electrons make certain jumps and as a result the wire in the lamp gives out light. In some appliances the wire only becomes warm, for example, in the electric cooker and the electric iron. As they throw themselves into the maze of coils, resistances and condensers, that is called a radio. All the different phenomena of light, the light of the glow-worm, a candle, a bulb, the discharge tube with which we are all familiar, are due to the jumps of the electrons. All chemical actions, and also photography are in fact the electrons' work, By means of photo-electric cells they play detectives and measure the light from the distant stars. Through radios, they save men's lives. They can bridge oceans, guide aircraft and give pleasure and relaxation to hundreds of millions of people. They work to move pictures on television screens.

The electrons still have a good deal in store for mankind. The stupidest and worst thing that men do with them is to misuse them — wage war! If people learn to cooperate as the electrons do, with a sincere regard for the welfare of their fellow men, then perhaps this world will be a better place to live in.

In the past year, we had a field trip led by Mr. Sze to Ma Sze Chau where we had collected valuable earth and stone samples of various kinds. Another excursion was to Ping Chau, and the wonderful landscape was recorded.

The aim is to increase knowledge in the observation of weather and the work is to learn to use the equipment we have, to make a report or forecast everyday's weather. It is being done by two members everyday except on holidays.

At present, we have more than 150 members and we have joined the 'Joint School Geography Association'. We also have planned to help in the projects they have organized which will be exhibited in the University of Hong Kong in August.

Lastly, we like to emphasize that 'Geography is no longer a textbook subject. Practical work more than any thing else has become the core of the subject and the spirit of the Society.'

We enjoy and at the same time help ourselves and others to be children of God.



Our Duke of Edinburgh's **Award** Scheme was established on the 18th October, 1973 under the supervision of Bro. Eugene and our group leader, Mr. Leung Bun.

This Scheme, initiated by His Royal Highness Prince Philip in 1956, is offered to the young people between their 14 and 25 birthdays. 
We would very much like to express our grateful thanks to the Principal for permission to use two classrooms for lectures on bridge and actual games.



They struggle hard, still they cannot find out the meaning of life and get nothing or give nothing to the world, except burden and sorrow.



# My Attitude Towards Sex Education

'Sex education' is no longer a rarelyseen term in these days. In fact, it is
flourishing rapidly in Western countries.
Though it has been introduced into Hong
Kong for several years, only a few schools
teach it. The people of the Orient deem
it indecent to talk about this matter
publicly. They do not allow children to
know about it, fearing that if they are exposed to it, they may only go astray. On
the other hand, Western people in general
treat it as nothing indecent as long as the
knowledge taught to the students is
healthy and constructive from the educational and moral points of view.

In my opinion, sex education is essential. Regarding it as a sort of knowledge, we should learn it. Moreover, it is directly related to ourselves. But, the scope of this knowledge varies from place to place, depending on the ethics the people hold. For instance, in Hong Kong, sex education is only in the so-called 'embryonic' stage. As the older generation still holds a tight view on this subject, it can only be introduced to a certain extent. Apparently, they cannot accept it all at a time. In other words, this has got to be done gradually.

To back up my agreement with the teaching of sex education, I should like to draw your attention to the direct influences resulting from it. Children are enabled to have clearer concepts on how they are physically related to their parents. They may have deeper insight into what 'sex' is and may lose curiosity in it. Before, many

crimes originated from having the wrong ideas on 'sex'. Thus, the rate of sexual crimes is reduced. Besides, the filthy idea of sex will be abolished. As for the married grown-ups they may lead a fuller and happier sexual life. For instance, they may know how to use contraceptive pills to implement birth control.

- Time: We should educate the individual at the right moment, though in fact, the baby begins to learn about sex almost from the day of birth. For example: During the stage of infancy, we should concentrate the teaching on the topics such as "feelings" of attachments while at childhood, we should stress on the topics such as, "love" and facts about growth body-development, etc.
- Content: We should begin with the basic ideas such as 'Distinction between boys and girls' and gradually turn into topics as 'Where babies come from' and 'The Family as the basic unit of society' etc. Later, we can come to the topics of higher level such as 'Pregnancy', 'Contraception' etc.
- Teacher: Preferably, an expert should be appointed, as ordinary teachers cannot adequately explain it to the students.
- 4. Place: The effect will be more prominent if it is being taught in school. Since other kinds of knowledge can be learnt efficiently in school, why cannot sex education be taught?

### What is a Good Citizen

Therefore, a good citizen earns what he gets.


If he works hard, he can kill two birds with one stone. He works for his family, and for his society as well.

Through this, he develops the sense of responsibility, which is not only a rich quality in a good citizen but also in any person.




# LA SALLE COLLEGE BADGE

The use of the coat-of-arms dates back to antiquity. Blazons, as they were called in the Middle Ages, were used by armies, corporations, merchant guilds as signs of identification, and as symbols of origin, particular office or ideals. To-day they are better known as badges and their use has spread among clubs, societies and schools.

The Art of Heraldry is the name given to the study of the history, the development and the significance of the coat-of-arms. And like all sciences it has its own terminology or technical terms. The objects represented on a shield are known as charges on a background called field. The commonest tinctures (colours) of these charges and field were: gules (red), sable (black), azure (blue), silver, gold. Now all these things were symbols. A symbol is something that stands for more than itself.

It acts by suggestion, an oak a symbol of strength, solidity, a dove and/or an olive branch stands for peace, a book is a symbol of learning.

Originally, a coat-of-arms was of simple design — a symbol on a single field. Later, a knight would include his wife's family's blazon (an early concession to women's lib?) by the side of his own. The shield was parted by a vertical line called pale and the charges were impaled on two fields, the sinister side and the dexter side — the left side and the right side of the wearer. respectively.. Sometimes,. the shield would further be divided into three (like our badge) or even four quarters. Finally, a legend, i.e. an inscription or Motto, in Latin, French or English was added above or below as an ideal to strive for.



#### LA SALLE BADGE

With this as background information let us now turn to our own School Badge. Judging by the large number of *Charges* in it, as you can see, it is rather rich in symbolism. The three fields represent:

- (1) the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools (top);
- (2) Our Founder, St. John Baptist de La Salle (sinister side);
- (3) La Salle College (dexter side).

The radiant star in (1) is taken from the coat-of-arms of the Order of the De La Salle Brothers. A star has always been a symbol of the high ideal we should set ourselves to attain. It is something that seems to beckon us ever onwards and upwards. When we urge people to have a lofty aim in life, we tell them to hitch their waggon to a star. And it makes us think,

too, of the wise men of the East — the Magi — who followed their guiding star all the way till it brought them to the very fount of Divine wisdom and knowledge.

The Chevrons in (2) — three broken lines — have been taken from the coat-of-arms of the Rheims branch of the La Salle family. You may have seen similar designs on the sleeves of military uniforms. They indicate rank and length of service. On that particular coat-of-arms they symbolised the long and faithful service which the members of the La Salle family, several of them at the cost of their lives, had rendered to both Church and State. A chevron is a symbol of firmness and constancy.

In (3) the Lamp is, of course, a symbol of the light of knowledge. And the lamp and the book together may be taken as a compound symbol of study or the process of learning. Such a symbol is a very appropriate one for a school badge, for the main purpose of a school is to impart knowledge and encourage study.

On the book are inscribed four Chinese Characters:

#### 克己復禮

This motto was given us by our late and much regretted Mr. T.F. Mak as very suitable for our School. It may be rendered thus: "By self-culture bring yourself to behave rightly to everyone and on every occasion. Keep in tune with men, events, even with nature."


The symbolism of the Olive Branch (right) and the Oak Branch (left) enclosing the shield, have already been alluded to, i.e. Peace and Strength (of character), respectively.

The Legend below, carries the Motto: FIDES et OPERA, which means literally, FAITH and WORKS. It is an exhortation to us to prove our religious beliefs by our good works. It reminds us of the saying

of St. James: "Faith without works is dead."

The Cross that surmounts the badge is, as everyone knows, the symbol of the Christian Charity and Love that should permeate and motivate all our actions.

Semper which means Praise be to God always. One further point I would like to draw attention to and that is that the artist who designed our badge has not differentiated between the Olive Branch and the Oak — this possibly for reasons of simplicity.

一九七三年十月初,本會舉辦了馬屎洲及鹽田仔之地理 考察旅行。該兩地位於本港東北吐露海港中,立於船灣淡水 湖堤壩之西南,上面滿佈着自然地理的景觀,茲將該次考察 之沿岸地形摘錄於下:

(甲)海岸地形 (Coastal Land Forms)

該兩島之西及北岸,因背風浪的關係,較多海岸沉積地形(Coastal depositional Iand forms ),遠處飄來之沙石,岸上冲下之碎礫,堆成沙灘(Sand Beach)、礫灘(Shingle Beach)和混合灘(Mixed Beach),且夾帶着破瓶碎木等雜物。

最突出之堆積地形是該處之連島洲(Tombolo),乃沙咀(Sand Spit)之積高,將鹽田仔與馬屎洲相連,(見圖一),鹽田仔之北端,亦有連鳥洲直繫北開小島。且鹽田仔與大陸上之沙欄(Sha Lan )岬角,原亦有沙積相接,謂之陸連島(Land-tied I sland ),然今已爲人工堤壩所基。

沿兩島之東南岸,因受盛行風浪冲擊,故較多海岸侵蝕 地形(Coastal Erosional Land Forms),如浪蝕平台( Wave-Cut Platform),礁石海岸(Reef Coast),及如 圖二之海蝕洞穴(Sea Cave)。

(乙)風化地形 (Weathering Land Forms)

因暴露在大氣中而造成的地殼的分解,謂之風化過程。 沿馬尿洲及鹽田仔之岸側,我們可以找到許多經受風化作用 的巖石!

許多巖石因受水浸日蒸的影响,石內心及石外殼之脹縮 力不等,遂外殼破裂, 形成如圖三之龜背石(Septaria)

有的巖石原具有直角相交之節理(Joints),受溫度變異而沿節理處產生「塊狀崩解」(Block Disintegration),見圖四之節理方塊(Joint Block)。

亦有巖石因受風化之裂痕加深而分成兩塊,是爲石裂巖 體(Rock Split)(見圖五。)

由於風化營力未必均等,更由於巖石本身礦物抗力,能 溶度、受氧化度等等多有不同,故沿岸亦見到許多差異風化 之地形 ( Differential Weathering Land Forms );加成 斑點面(Pitted Surface)(見圖六),或成格子面(Lattice Surface)(見圖七),或成帶狀面(Banded Surface) (見圖八)。

其實此兩島之溫度極熱,且易受海水冲浸,故除上述例子外,其他因化學風化而造成之蜂窩狀風化地形 (Honey-Comb Weathering Forms),和球狀風化地形 (Spheroidal forms),更不時可以在沿岸處找到。

(丙)褶曲地形(Fold Land Forms)

圖八之巖石呈彎曲排列,乃因地殼本身產生橫壓力而形成,謂之褶曲地形。此情形可在馬屎洲之東岸找到。此處之褶曲多爲不對稱之褶曲 (Asymmetric Fold),且因巖層爲間隔之石英巖(Quartzite)和頁巖(Shale)並列,前者硬於後者,故受差異風化而抗力不同,遂使石英巖隆起而成巖脊,頁巖則成陷落之巖溝。

馬屎洲及鹽田仔更具有多種巖石之交差結構,名火成巖(Igneous Rock)和沉積巖(Sedimentary Rock),以及多種浸入之巖脈(Dykes),故使整個地形更爲複雜,希望以後有機會的時候,再作進一步的研究。
