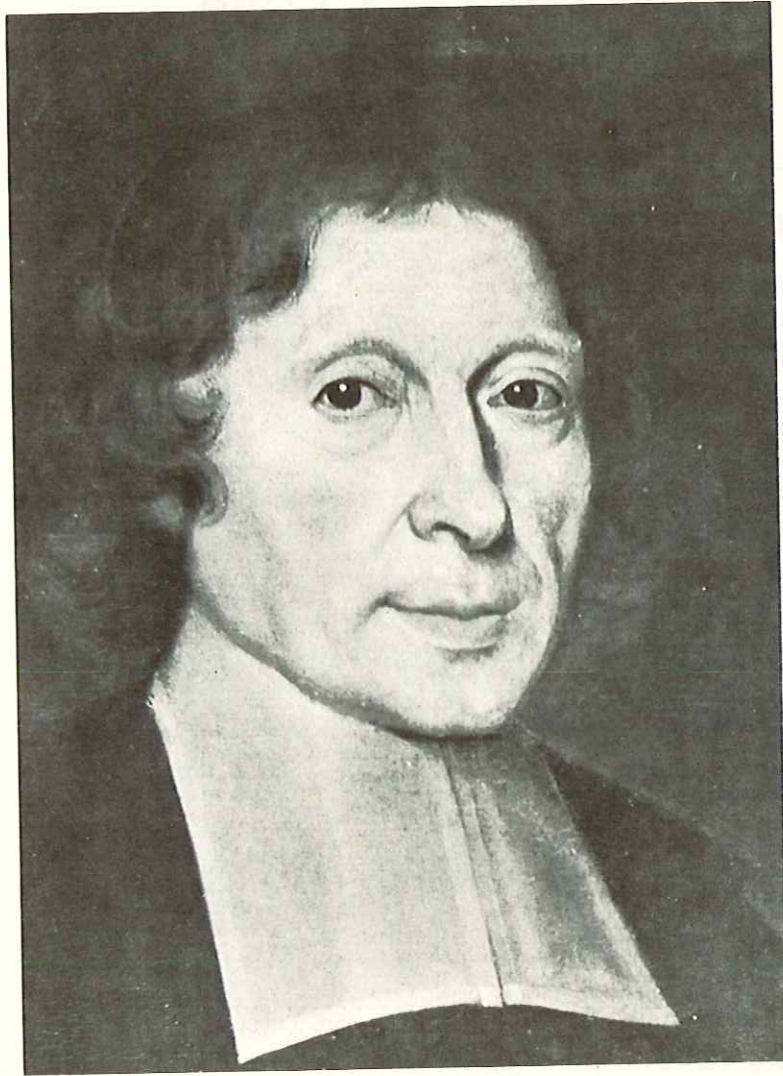

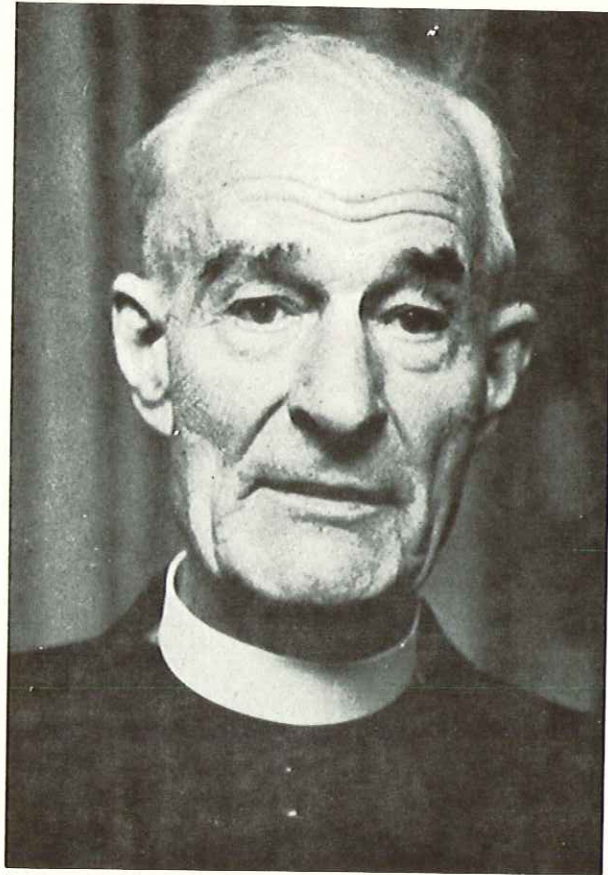

## DO YOU KNOW?

Do you know that Brother Paul has lived under 12 Governors of Hong Kong (Lugard, May, Stubbs, Peel, Caldecott, Northcote, Young, Grantham, Black, Trench, MacLehose) 6 Catholic Bishops (Pozzoni, Valtorta, Bianchi, Hsu, Lei, Wu), 7 Popes (Leo, Pius X, Benedict, Pius XI, Pius XII, John, Paul), 6 monarchs of the British Empire (Victoria, Edward VII, George V, Edward VIII, George VI, Elizabeth).

Many things which are very common today came into existence during his life-time: When X-rays were discovered Brother Paul was 5 years old; first cinema, 5 years old; radio telegraphy, 11 years old; first aeroplane flown, 14 years old; first "talkie" film, 36 years old; first loudspeaker, 34 years old; first motor-scooter, 29 years old; radar, 32 years old; war tank, 24 years old; television, 36 years old; first helicopter, 40 years old; first hovercraft, 65 years old; first jet engine, 47 years old; first transistor, 58 years old; photostat machine, 47 years old.

History is often compared to a tapestry or cloth, the different threads, events, make up the pattern. The Christian Brothers, last year, celebrated their 100 years in Hong Kong. In the warp and woof of the fabric of these 100 years of history runs a definite continuous thread for our dear Brother Paul who has made a very palpable and substantial contribution to the work of the Brothers during his 69 years of zeal and endeavour.

He arrived in Hong Kong in 1907. The Empress Dowager still reigned over the mainland of China. King Edward VII was ruler of the British Empire. Brother Paul has seen 4 monarchs of England come and go and a long line of Governors from Lord Lugard to Sir Murray MacLehose. Four years after his arrival he witnessed the foundation of the Republic of China. He survived the Japanese Occupation during the last war. The proverb states "that only the good die young" but to every rule there are notable exceptions.

He was an excellent teacher, thorough and devoted. His "old" boys, many of them holding very prominent posts in the Colony and overseas testify to his firmness, insistence on hard work and vigor-

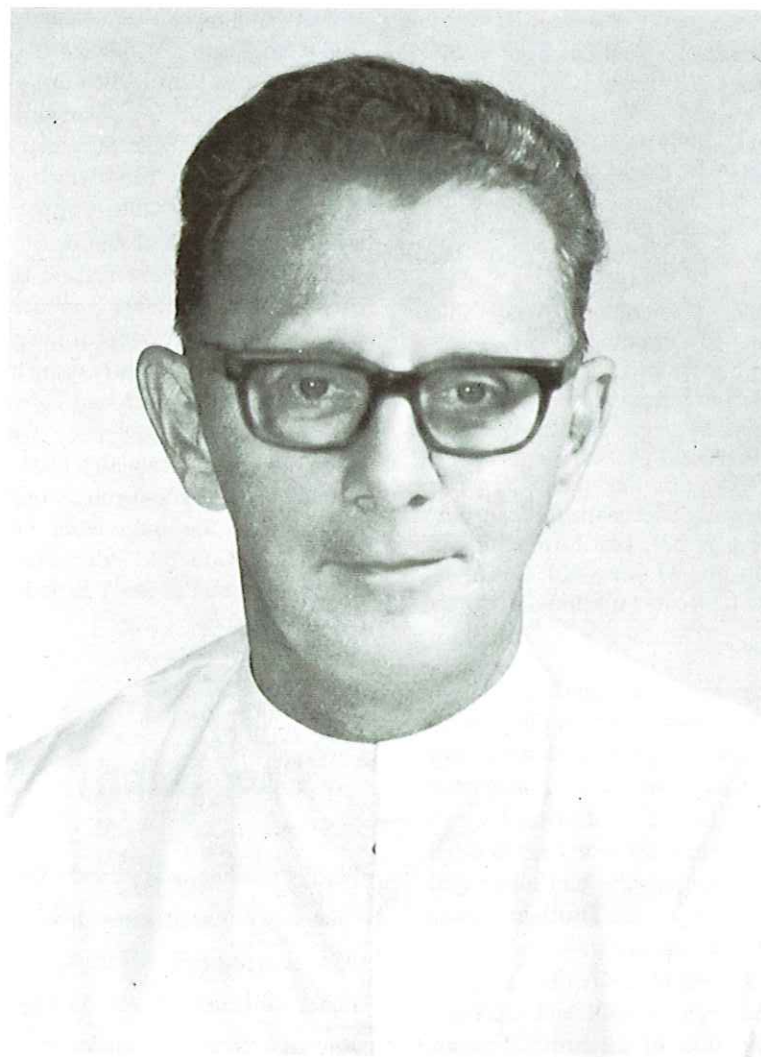
ous exercise.

In 1917, he was appointed Headmaster of the newly established Junior Branch School of St. Joseph's College on the mainland in Chatham Road. Under his inspired guidance it developed into La Salle College, which Brother Aimar opened in Kowloon Tong in 1932. La Salle College grew and prospered: a La Salle Secondary Evening School was established in 1964 which eventually became Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College when a new site was found (1969) in Homantin.

The most impressive feature of Brother Paul has been his inexhaustible appetite for hard work. Although now retired from the classroom, Brother Paul is still very sprightly using his leisure hours in beautifying the garden and fostering his long love for the flora of Hong Kong. We feel it an honour to be able to dedicate this issue of our school magazine to such a grand educationalist and congratulate him on the great work he has done in the service of God and education in this Colony. "Cheung Meng Pak Sui" (長命百歲)—life to one hundred years!

Dear Students of Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College,

I had the pleasure of visiting your fine college twice in 1975. On these two occasions I saw you in action both in class and on the playing field. My impressions in both cases were indeed very high. I would like to congratulate all concerned for the spirit of enthusiasm that is evident in abundance and the good results that are being achieved.

I have now been invited to send a message to be printed in the School Magazine. I send it to you with pleasure and in a spirit of gratitude for the honour implied.

I would like to take as the theme of my message, some thoughts on the subject of freedom. We hear a lot about freedom these days. But the kind of freedom some people talk about is not really freedom at all. They say for example that we should be free to do what we like. If you stop to think seriously for a moment, you will soon realize that this is not freedom at all. If each of us acted like this chaos and suffering would result. The fact of the matter is that where freedom is concerned, we are free to do what is right. A human being is not free to take drugs, a student is not free to neglect studies, a cyclist is not free to ride on the wrong side of the road and so on.

Both extremes mentioned above, fail to take into consideration that we have a spiritual side. This spiritual side implies that we recognize Almighty God—we came from God and we are going to return to God.

The main aim of a great school like Chan Sui Ki College, is to keep the great truth about Almighty God ever to the fore among its students and to produce people who will have great faith in God and an unswerving determination to live within the framework of His regulations as mature, responsible people with a high sense of values.

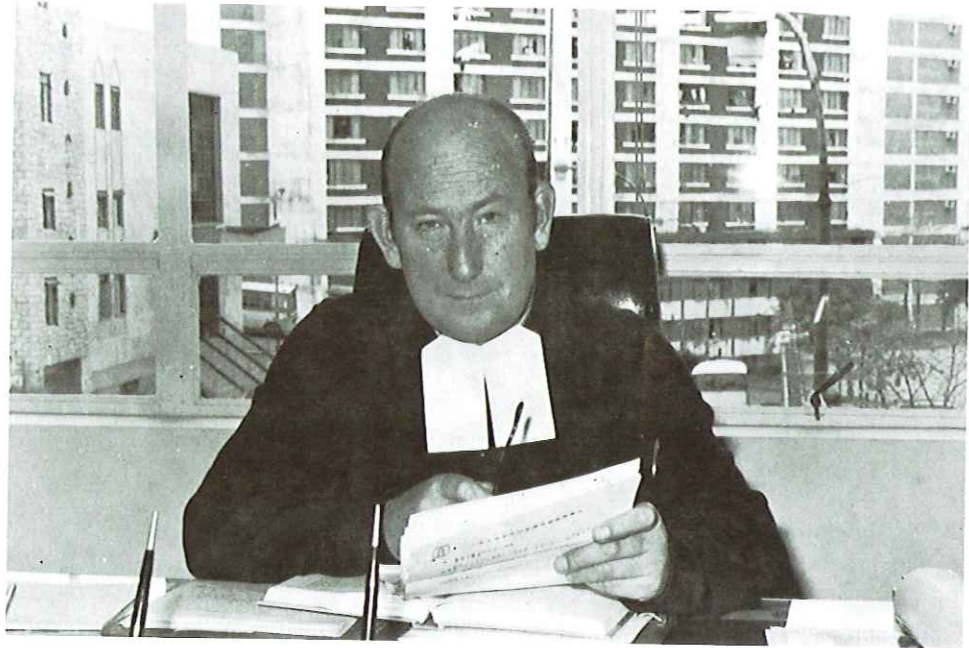

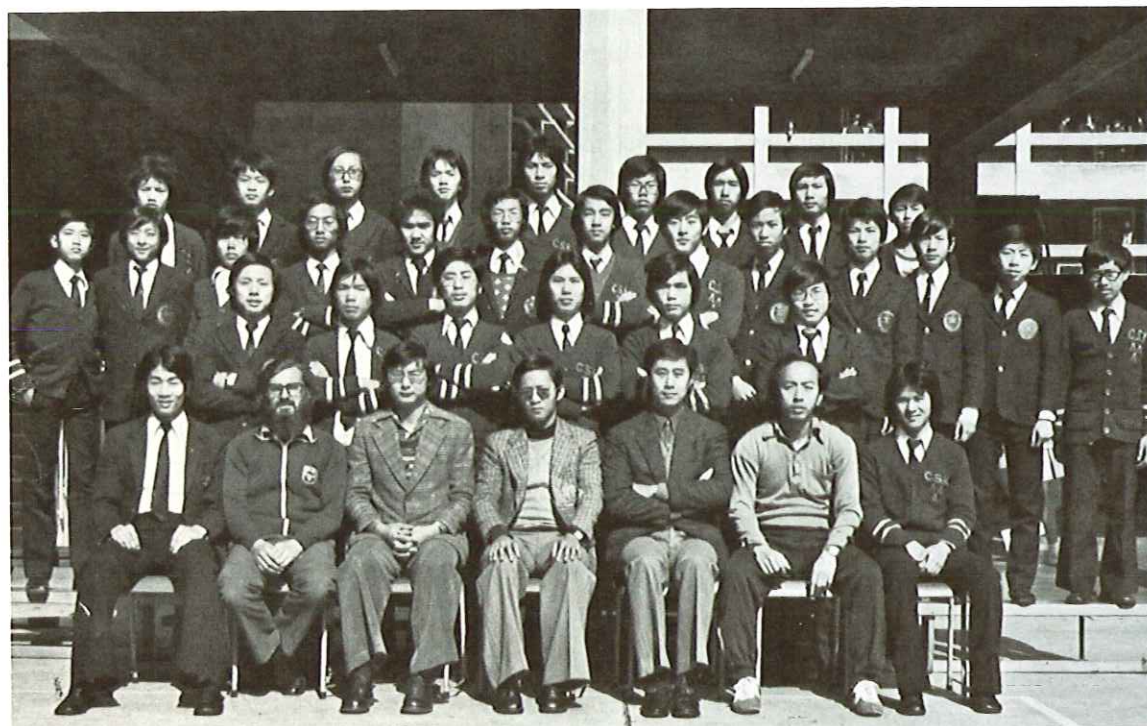
Our club was established on 1st October, 1975. Our aim is to arouse the boys' interest in sports and to train more athletes for our School.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Principal and all the teachers for their kind advice.

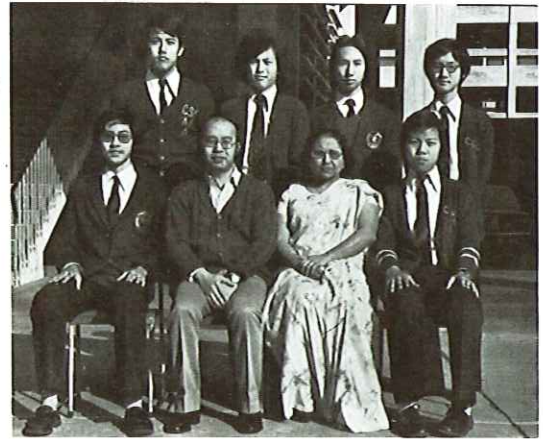

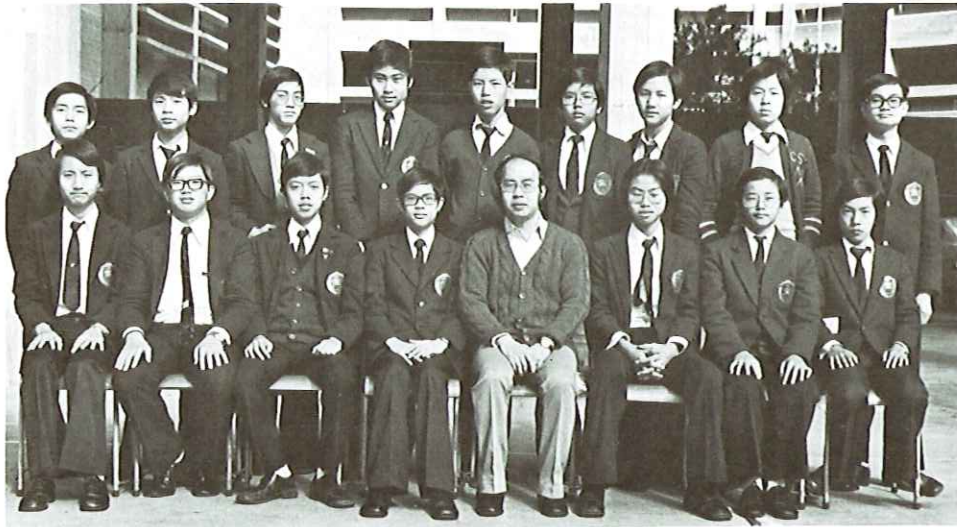

## MUSIC AND CHORAL ASSOCIATION

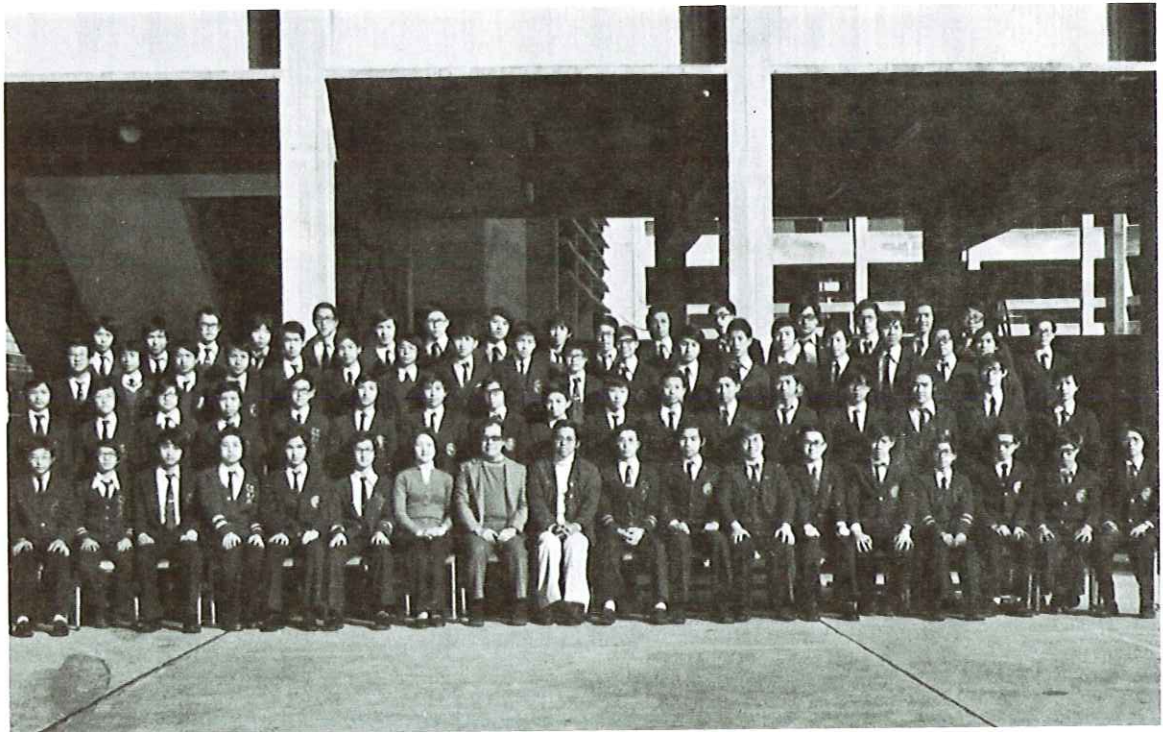
The Music and Choral Association has had another successful year since our last report.

In the Beginning of the school year the Senior Choir was conducted by Mr. K.L. Tsang who left in November, and, Dr. C.Y. Li has taken up the



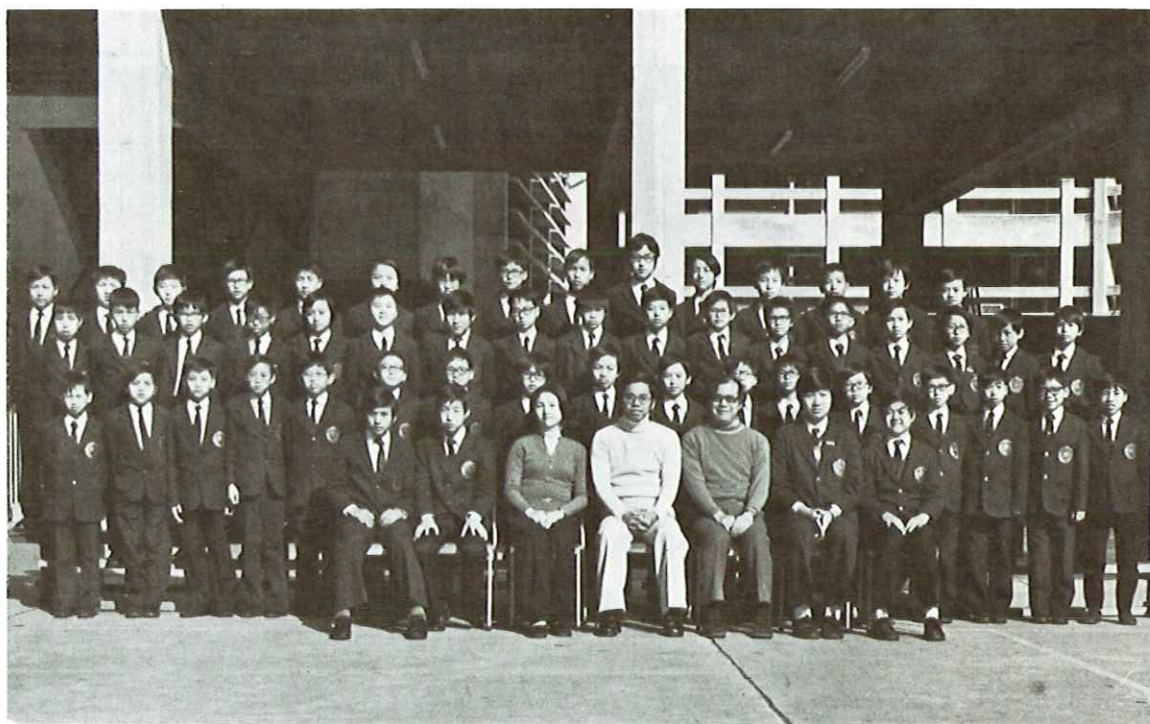

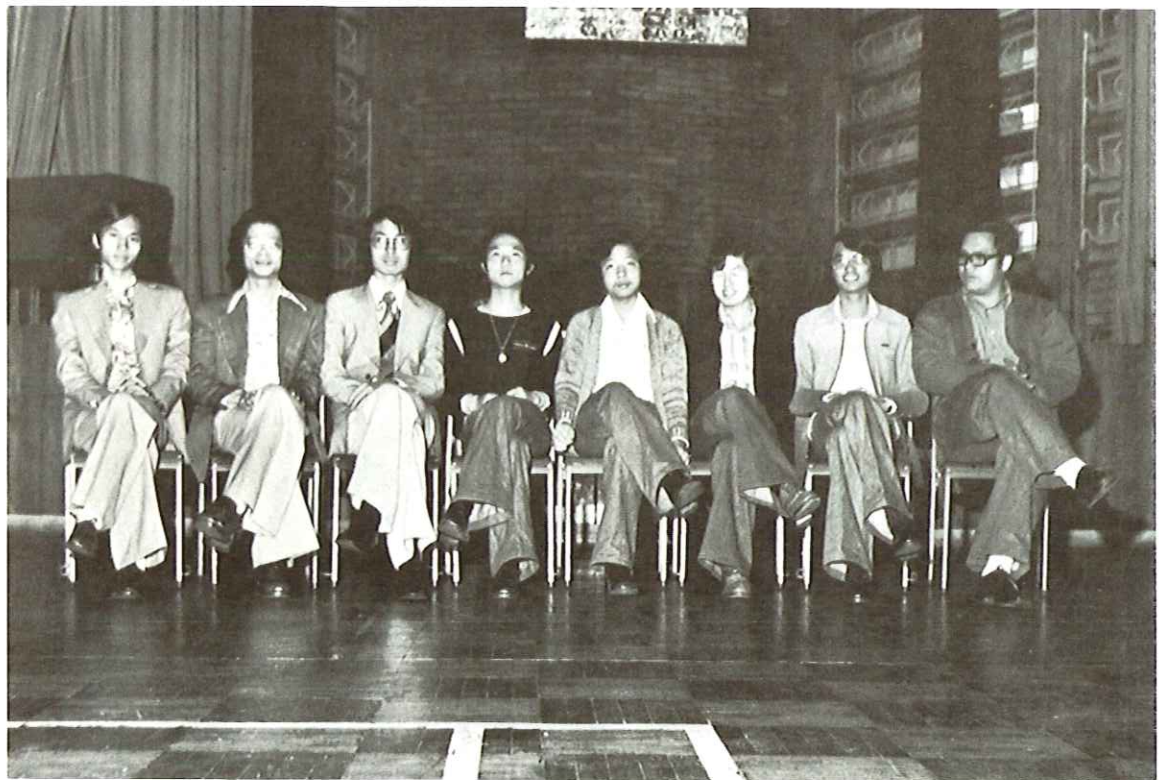

*September 1975*

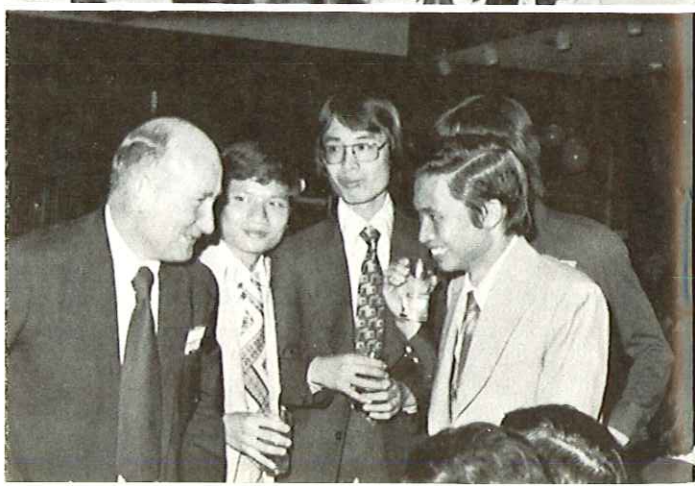
The 3rd Annual General Meeting of the Association was held in the School Library, and the Committee members were voted into office by the members.

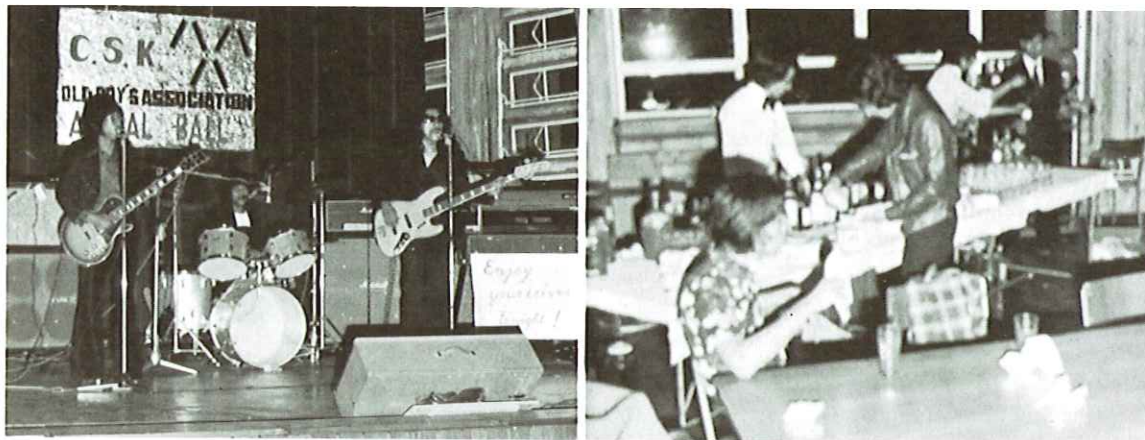

I have discussed the matter with Brother Casimir when I was back in Hong Kong last summer and we thank him for the school photos he gave us.

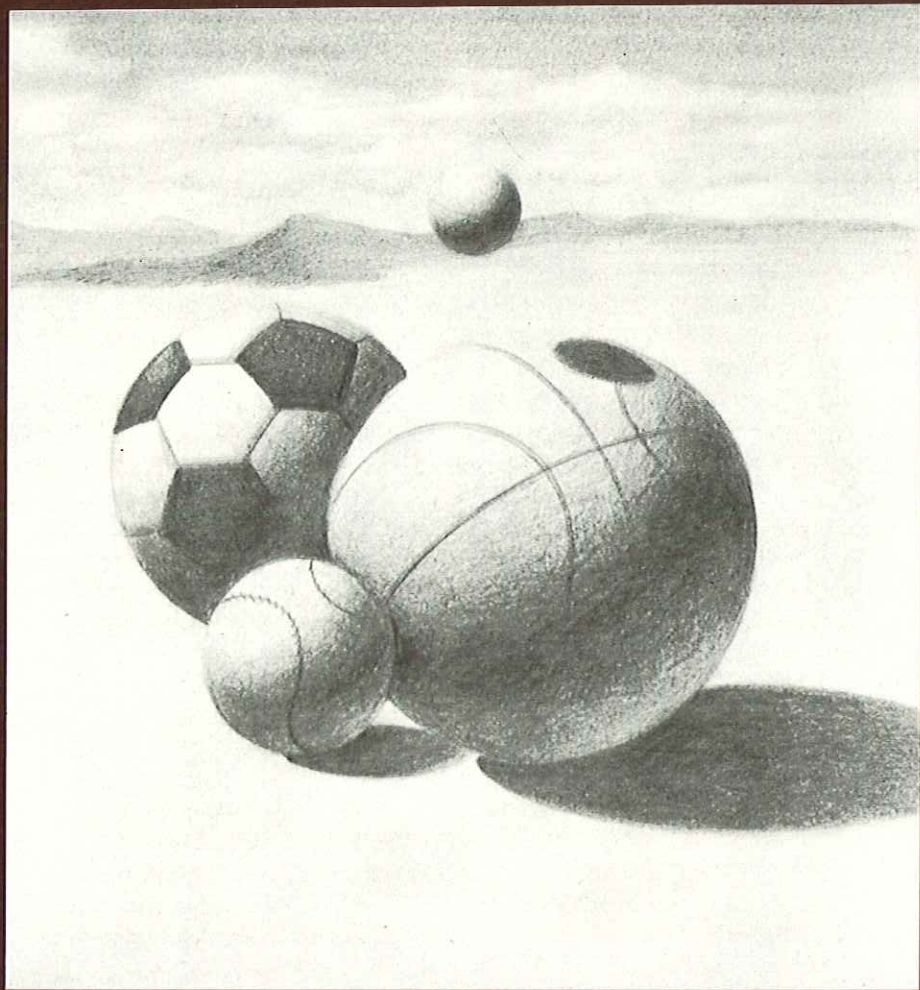

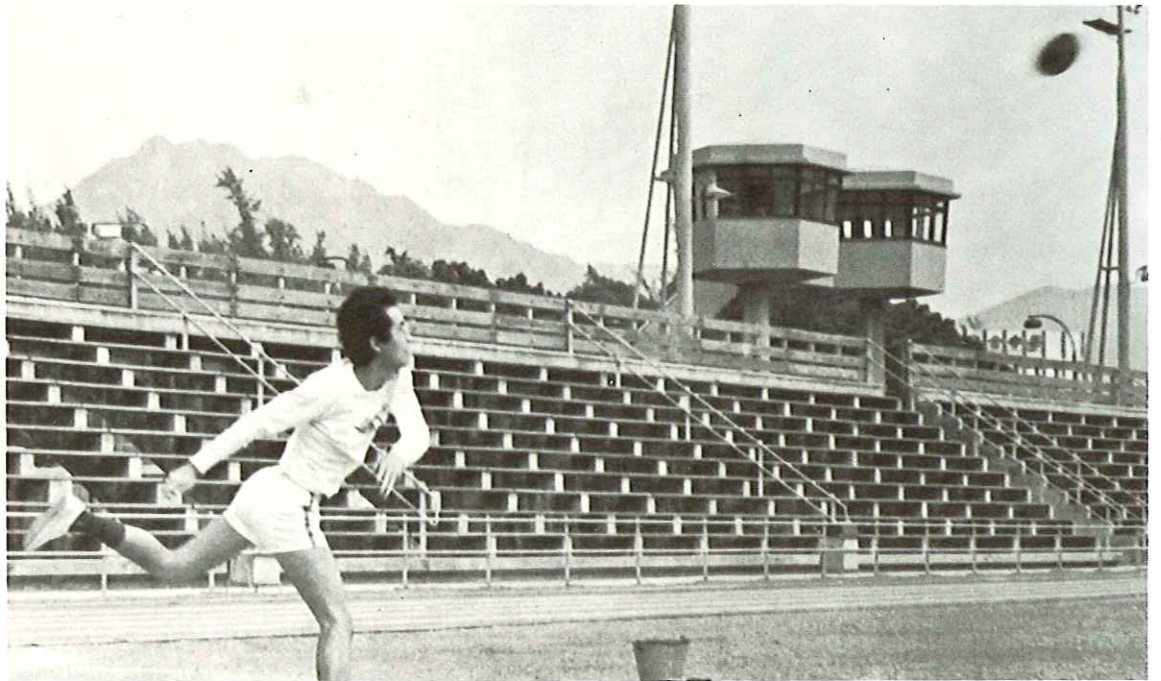

# SPORTS REPORT

In the Old Testament there is a passage referring to seven years of plenty followed by seven years of want. At one stage this season it looked as if our sports had already entered the second seven year period—not that the past years could be described as years of plenty! After promising starts in swimming, basketball, football and table-tennis we faltered mid-stream and in the end we had very little to show for our efforts. Fortunately, in the later half of the season our badminton, cross-country and athletics teams checked our decline and then went from strength to strength and turned in our best results ever in those sports, keeping alive our name in sports.

Inter-class competitions were held for all sports and for the first time ever everything was finished before Easter. We participated in seven Inter-School sports during the year and had teams in the CBSSA competitions for athletics, table-tennis and basketball—we hosted the basketball competition. Full results of all the sports are found at the end of the report.

## ATHLETICS

Without doubt this has been our most successful and rewarding season ever. No less than twenty four of our records have been broken during the season. The Inter-class competition had so many entries that up to ten heats were run for the sprints in all grades. Shortly after the Inter-class Meet we had the CBSSA Meet in early February and we filled what is becoming our usual positions—second (to La Salle) in A and B grades, while our C team was a very disappointing fourth. Perhaps it was the poor result, particularly in C grade, that sent us back to the classrooms to find better teams for the Inter-school Meet in March. More trials were

held and soon training started and we set off to the Govt. Stadium confident that we would not be relegated and hoping that we could win a banner somewhere along the line. The results of the training soon became apparent as most of our track team qualified for semi-finals and finals while on the field we were picking up standard points and places here and there. By the end of the final day we had made our mark in Athletics, such well known name as Pui Ching, Pui Kiu, Wah Yan and KGV were well below us in the points table. Even DBS will have cause to remember our name for the C grade team relegated them to fourth place—the first time they have not been in the top three for many years. Practically all members of the team turned in personal best performances and among those that were exceptionally good was that of the C grade Captain, Tsang Yau Ho (3A). He ran a 59.5" (CSK record) to finish 2nd. in the 400m and also set a new CSK record for the 800m with a time of 2'24"—a time which many of our B Graders would be glad to achieve! Our highlight in B grade came with a gold and silver in the Triple Jump for Leung Ki Wah (3A) and Tam Shek Tsai (3D) with both boys breaking the CSK record. Not to be outdone by the B boys both Dennis Pang (6A) and John Leung (7A) had a double each in A grade. Two gold medals went to Dennis for the 100m and 110m Hurdles again with CSK record times while John collected silvers in the 400m and 400m Hurdles. Besides those good results, A grade also had some bad luck when the baton got 'delayed' during the first change-over in the 4X100m relay with the result that the team failed to qualify for the final—our only relay team not to enter the finals. The A grade points were so close that had our relay team qualified there was every chance for the team to match the C grade and bring home the 3rd place banner.



## BADMINTON

Kowloon and Overall Champions again.

The results speak for themselves and need no words to back them up other than to say congratulations to the C grade boys for the second year in a row. Of the two titles that of Overall Champions is the one which means most to us because in winning it we avenged a defeat which cost us a place in the Final at the CSK organised Invitation Tournament held just two days prior to the Overall Final. We travelled over to Hong Kong to play St. Josephs' in the final without much hope of bringing back the trophy but memories of the previous Sunday's defeat were soon dispelled when Anthony Shek tore into his opponent with real determination and soon had him reeling. Then Bernard Yung, inspired no doubt by Anthony's success, attacked from the word go and soon, he too, had St. Josephs' wondering what had hit them. In fact they never recovered and the Overall Trophy was carried back to CSK in triumph—sweet revenge indeed. Our B grade team also did quite well this season coming runners-up to La Salle. Already they are looking forward to next season as most of the team will still be B grade next season.

## BASKETBALL, FOOTBALL, TABLE-TENNIS, SWIMMING

Four sports under one heading—what have they in common? As far as CSK is concerned the answer is that we failed to come in the top three in any of them this year at Inter-school level. Taking them in order and starting with the 'good wine' first we did win the CBSSA Open Basketball Competition beating La Salle (Kowloon Champions) by one point after two periods of extra time—that was a real cliff hanger. In the Inter-school games our C team reached the final round and finished fourth but both A and B teams failed to enter the final round. Our A team was very unlucky as they lost two second round games by just

two points and thus failed to qualify. In the Knockouts La Salle eliminated both our A and C teams by two points and one point respectively, while we reached the Semi-final in B grade only to lose by one point to Pui Shing. Lady Luck really seemed to have deserted us this season. Our football results were the worst ever with all three teams failing to reach the second round and we didn't enter the Knockouts. Table tennis produced a better result as we entered the second round in B and C grades with both teams coming 5th. Finally, swimming. Here again we thought we had a very good C team capable of winning but it was not to be because our record breaking free style relay team was mysteriously disqualified in the heats. On the final changeover we were already one length of the pool ahead and yet when finalists were announced we were not named. Inquiries revealed that we had been disqualified for a foul change! The loss of these sixteen points pushed us from possible champions to fourth place. B grade also had to be content with fourth place but in their case it was equal fourth with two other schools.

## CROSS COUNTRY

Having to take part in the Kowloon Cross Country races on the same day as our own Athletics finals did not improve our chances of success, but A and B grades overcame their tiredness and both finished 3rd and qualified for the Colony Championships. C grade were not quite up to it and came in seventh. Training for the Championships lasted for nearly three weeks and we went over to Stanley feeling more confident than we were at Fanling, even though we knew we had to compete with the top three schools from Hong Kong, the N.T. as well as the Kowloon winners. B grade ran first and the three weeks of hard training came to fruition when we finished a very close 2nd to KGV, —82 points to 87. The success of the B Graders was not repeated by A grade as they finished a very good fourth only two points behind third and six points behind the runners-up. Nevertheless it was a considerable improvement on their Fanling run.

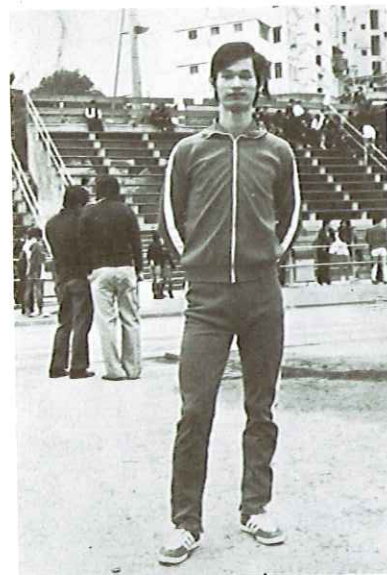


## SOFTBALL

The most disappointed boys in school this year are the Softballers. Runners-up in the league last season, they were soon organised and had regular training in the playground in preparation for this season only to find that the Softball Association has not, as yet, organised a Schools League this season. None the less, training continues and the way softballs are being sent flying round the playground we have quite a formidable team and hope that next season there will be an Inter-school league.

To bring this report to a close tribute must be paid to two students who during their years in CSK have done so much to bring us honour and fame by participation, encouragement and achievement in sport, particularly athletics. Unfortunately, both boys have reached the end of road as Inter-school representatives as they will be overage for A grade next season. The students are of course John Leung and Dennis Pang. John first represented the school as a C grade boy in 1971 when he was a member of the Football team, Cross Country team and a bronze medal winner in High Jump at the Inter-school athletics meet. Since

then he has represented us every year up to the present. He was on the B grade athletics team when we were Champions in Division Two in 1973 and again in 1974 he helped us win promotion to Div. One when as an A grader he won the 400m Hurdles and was 2nd in the 400m. Besides athletics John is also a fine footballer and in 1974 he had the honour to be chosen to represent Hong Kong in the Asian Schoolboys Football Competition in Manila, but it was an honour that turned sour when at the last minute the Govt. refused to subsidise the team and the trip was cancelled. This season he Captained the A Grade Football team and, as mentioned in the report, he collected two silver medals in the Inter-school athletics, beaten in both events by a Hong Kong representative athlete. Unlike John, Dennis never represented us at C or B grade. The reason was that Dennis was over-height! However, Dennis has run for CSK for the past five years as an A Grader in the 100m and 110m Hurdles and has never failed to collect at least one medal each year. He climaxed his career this year when for the first time he won both events—a very satisfying and suitable reward for five years of determination and sincere dedication. Our thanks and congratulations to both of you—you will be missed.

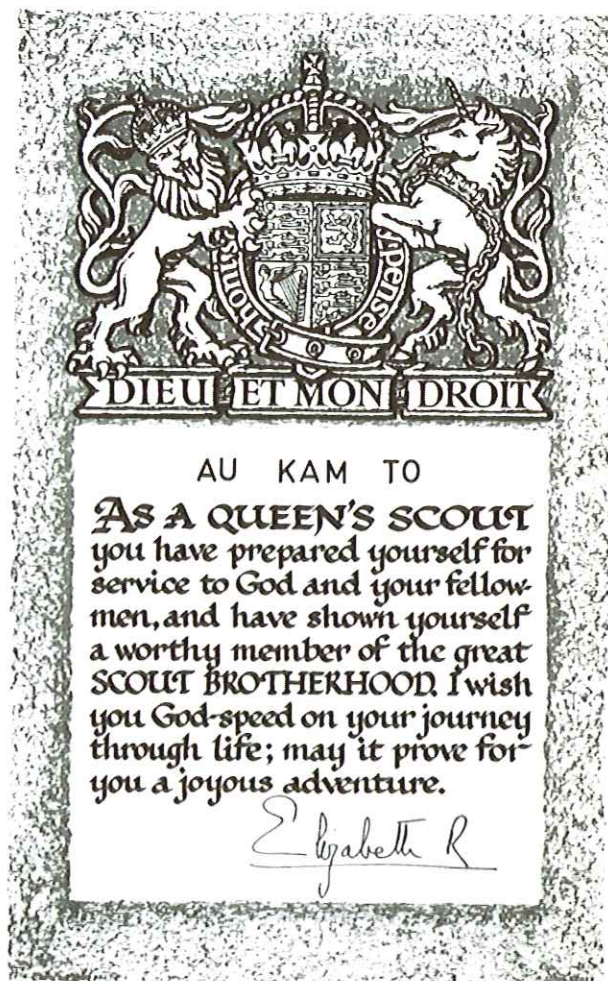

# Travel Log.

"Travel, in the younger sort, is a part of education; in the elder a part of experience."

The profundity of Bacon's observation can only be realised when one actually travels. None of us who undertook the journey described below had any inkling of this great truth. It began to dawn on us soon after the start of the journey and continued to become ever clearer as the journey progressed.

There are perhaps few experiences in life so thrilling as travelling. We feel that the urge in mankind to travel is as deep seated perhaps as any of his primordial instincts. History is replete with instances of man's urge to extend the frontiers of his physical and intellectual vision throughout the millennia and in more recent centuries Marco Polo, Columbus, Cortez, Captain Cook and in our own times Scott, Lindbergh and others have by their heroic efforts demonstrated very clearly the irrepressible spirit of man.

In these days of the jets, the world has shrunk so greatly, that what Columbus took years to traverse can now be done in a matter of hours. Yet we

somehow felt that to rush through the air at 500 m.p.h. and flit from place to place, would rob our undertaking of the very great joy of being our own pilots and exploring the different lands and cities and coming into as much contact with different races as could possibly be done with the limits imposed by our somewhat meagre resources and the available time.

Putting our heads together, we hit upon the happy idea of taking a car with us and travelling as much by it over the land masses as was possible and then shipping the car across the vast oceans to points, where we could fly over and pick it up again. 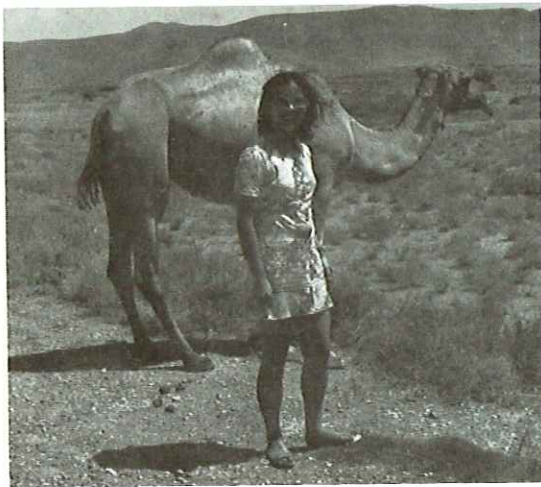

A quick dash 120-130 miles away brought us to regal Delhi unique among the great Capitals of the world in that here one sees as nowhere, the blending of two entirely different cultures, oriental and western and architecture recording the history of different races over more than 2½ millennia. Striking northwest, we entered Pakistan and after going through the historic Khyber Pass arrived (2) at Kabul, the Capital of Afghanistan (3).

From there onwards we set our course westwards. We went across the ancient land of Iran which in the distant past had raised one of the greatest civilizations and Empires in history, till we crossed the Border again into Turkey which also has a fascinating and chequered history and reached the famous Turkish city of Istanbul. This was the westernmost point in Asia and our breathtakingly colour-

ful journey so far brought us in front of the Blue Mosque (4) said to be the largest Muslim Mosque in the world.

Leaving Turkey behind, we entered Greece, the cradle of all Hellenic and European civilization and culture. We made for Athens, the Capital (5) shows the Acropolis brightest among so many other jewels, the glory of Greek architecture that still stands as a monument to man's achievement as he

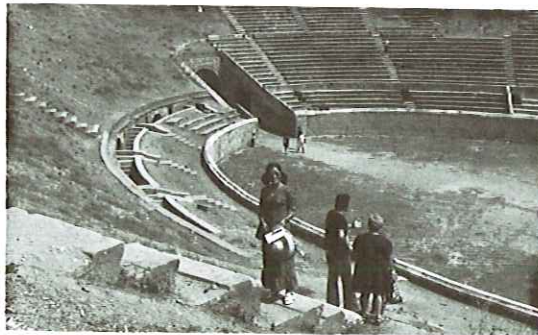
evolved from the dark days of life in subterranean caves. Our stout hearted Datsun took us to Patras westwards in Greece where we embarked on our voyage across the Adriatic and landed in Brindisi—the Eastern Sea Board Port of Italy. We went south in Italy to Pompeii (6) the ancient town at the foot of Mt. Vesuvius which on its eruption in 79 A.D. completely buried the city in lava and ash. It again saw the light of day from 1775 onwards through continuous excavations.

We then went northwards through Italy, that great centre of European civilization which followed on the heels of the demise of its Greek predecessor, gave to Europe the Roman Empire and continued to remain after the fall of the Roman Empire and through the Dark Middle Ages on to the Renaissance the fountainhead of European Culture particularly in Rome (7) and Florence (8) where for centuries Italian genius flowered and continued to do so to the present day.

From Florence we struck westwards entering France at Nice that sparkling gem amongst Mediterranean holiday resorts where the beach extends for 2 miles. Our robust little Datsun took us to Paris which has been regarded as perhaps the finest example of town planning in Europe and no wonder

Ambassadors and Kings, invalids and soldiers on furlough, all make up the never-ending train of voyagers; but to those who have never left their native land the traveller will always proffer the maxim that there is no place like home."



# CLASSROOM POWER

The teacher derives his authority from outside the classroom, but the amount of authority he has inside the classroom depends on his personal power of which there are four main aspects, charisma, dominance, intellectual power, and resources power, the relative amounts required varying according to the teaching situation. Keeping discipline was seen to involve the content of an order or regime, how it is established and how it is maintained; it was also seen to be crucially linked to the question of legitimacy.

In establishing the order he has decided on, the teacher must be fully aware that what happens in the first few encounters with the pupils is likely to establish the relationship which he will have to live with for the rest of his time with that particular class. It is vital therefore that when the first challenges occur, he deals with them successfully.

Let us suppose that it is essential, for his influence to be effective, that he imposes an order that requires complete pupil attention whilst he is talking (or at least complete apparent attention). The early manoeuvres are crucial. With a mixture of charisma (if he has it), intellectual power and resources power, he will proceed to unfold to his pupils the programme he has prepared for them. The pupils will watch him carefully and test his order. The situation has elements of a game, but it is a power game, a struggle for power, a conflict in which the pupils are seeking albeit with mixed feelings to win a more congenial order for themselves than the teacher wants. This is not to imply that the pupils are usually organised for the challenge. Fairly soon, however, a pupil will speak to his neighbour while the teacher is holding forth to the class. Since this clashes with the order the teacher is seeking to establish, he must immediately be able to do something. This is where dominance is indispensable. If he fails to deal with the situation successfully, a relationship will crystallise in which he will always have to compete to be heard.

Such an incident can only be dealt with by the application of some sanction, however mild. A glare or quiet word of rebuke may be sufficient.

The situation can be compared to playing a game of bridge or whist, where normally the smallest card necessary to take the trick will be played, though in this case the virtues of playing a fairly high card might be considered. Each teacher probably has some sort of personal scale of sanctions (influenced partly by the school in which he works), and this will include a highest card beyond which he will not go, the next step being left to the head teacher's discretion. Generally the aim must be to succeed with minor sanctions, among which, 'withdrawal sanctions', to be discussed later, will feature prominently.

But what happens if the card is not effective and the miscreant ignores the sanction? It is even worse if a high card has been played. This inevitably leads to a discussion of 'elementary escalation', a pupil strategy designed to see if the teacher is prepared to defend the authority he is seeking to establish and if necessary invoke higher sanctions. The writer's view is that he must use higher sanctions in this case because he cannot afford to lose the encounter. There is the trap of course of using up all one's sanctions (the big cards have to be played very carefully) and being left virtually powerless—not an easy situation and one that doesn't only happen to the inexperienced.

One might now fruitfully discuss whether the order the teacher sought to impose in the first place was too ambitious. However, it must be remembered that he must seek to establish conditions that enable him effectively to influence his pupils. Rather than reduce the bounds of his order, he would be wise to consider the use of his resources power.

If it is his aspiration that the pupils should not talk when he is talking, it will be necessary to analyse how long he is talking and what he is saying. With children and adolescents, most of whom have limited powers of concentration when called upon to listen to the spoken word enunciated by a moderate speaker, it may pay to say as little as possible and make it effective. However, the less that is said, the more activity that has to be organised, which means that considerable attention has to be



given to the organisation of pupil work. If another aspect of the order the teacher seeks to impose is that the pupils shall not leave their seats without permission (leaving aside the desirability of such a rule), the teacher is likely to receive fewer challenges to his power if he meticulously prepares and organises the work he wants the class to do, creates few opportunities for the pupils to leave their seats and continually places himself in a position to supervise. One might say, therefore, that high resources power reduces the occasions when dominance has to be used; this is true both with establishing and maintaining order.

The practical wisdom 'It is easier to slacken off than to tighten up', introduces a further aspect of legitimacy in the process of establishing an order. The teacher whose order controls many areas of pupil behaviour is in a position to concede minor areas without serious loss; he is in a stronger position of course if the concession is made by his power, and not obtained by a successful exercise of his pupils' power. In fact towards the end of a course greater permissiveness is often used as a reward.

The other side of the coin, and it is very important, is that what has not been established at the outset as being the teacher's legitimate order, cannot subsequently be imposed without a severe power struggle that the teacher is likely to lose. The pupils will challenge the new area since an attempt is being made to outlaw behaviour that was previously regarded as legitimate. Hence the difficulties of the inexperienced teacher who like a lamb to the slaughter has gone into the classroom thinking that the pupils will like him, find the work he has for them very stimulating, his voice and ideas very attractive and so on. Well as he has prepared his work the volume of noise rises in the class, interesting as his activities are the pupils throw things when he isn't looking. In despair he announces with regret: 'We will stop talking!' and in greater despair finds he is completely unable to enforce his demands. His error was that he had failed to establish an order suitable for the effective use of his resources; later, when he attempted to impose such an order, it was not regarded as legitimate. It can further be suggested from such an example that high resources power without dominance is likely to leave the teacher ineffective.

The process of maintaining order is in many ways less of a problem than that of establishing it. This is because the teacher is at this stage operating in a context in which the relationship between himself

and the class has crystallised. It is now clear how far the teacher's order extends. Dominance is still needed of course as the pupils will still trespass on his domain. But they will regard his punishments and rewards as legitimate provided that they broadly conform with the sort of relationship that has been established. The most important aspect of maintaining order, however, involves the use of resources power. As we have seen, the higher the resources power, the fewer the occasions for the use of dominance; the weaker the resources power, the more occasions the class get restless and in various ways threaten the order that has been established.

A further comment on sanctions is now required. The teacher who has been able to establish the conditions for the effective use of his intellectual and resources power will have gained the position of being able if necessary to use temporary withdrawal of these powers as a sanction—this is what is meant by 'withdrawal sanctions' referred to earlier. Thus 'Put your pens down!' when used as a sanction is only likely to be effective for those pupils who consider that they are writing something worthwhile. Those teachers who have frequent recourse to more severe sanctions will normally be underpowered in some way. Teachers are therefore right in being apprehensive about too often sending pupils to the head teacher. One of the ironies of this area of discussion is that those teachers with the greatest reluctance to use dominance must have most frequent recourse to major sanctions since they are unable to dominate enough to use minor ones. It might be observed at this point that teaching tends to attract tender people to a job in which too much tenderness is often a liability.

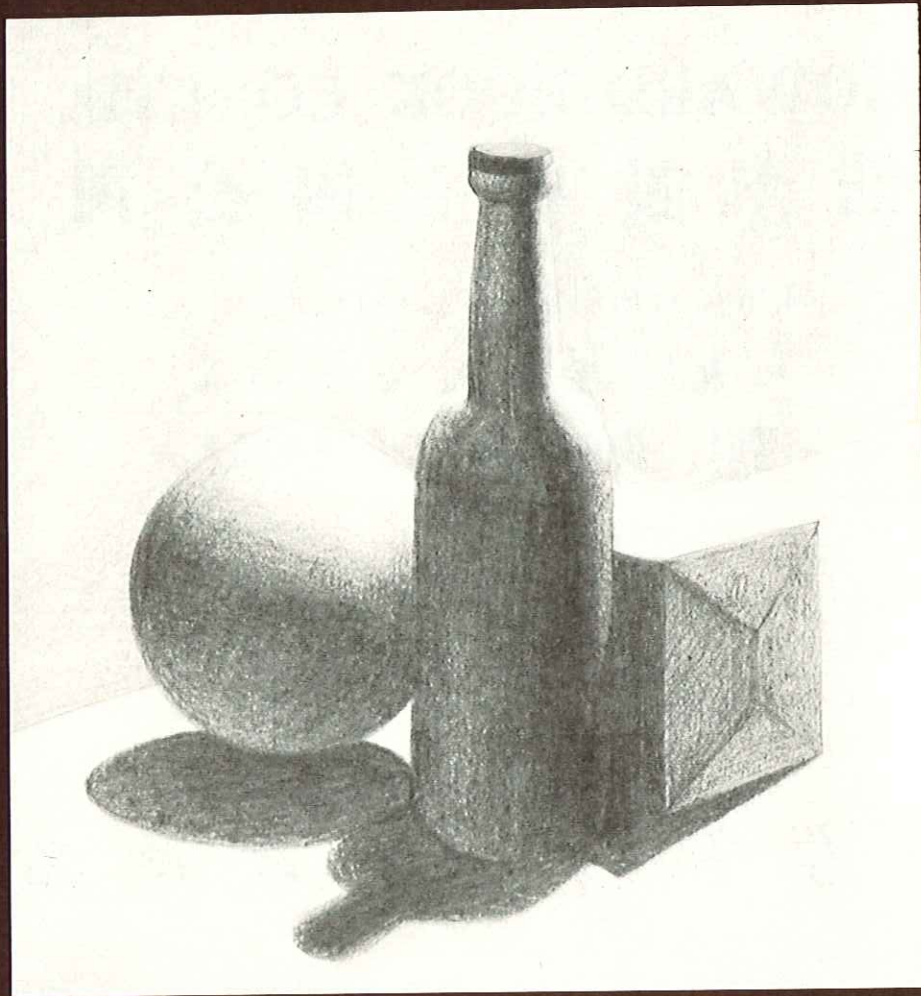

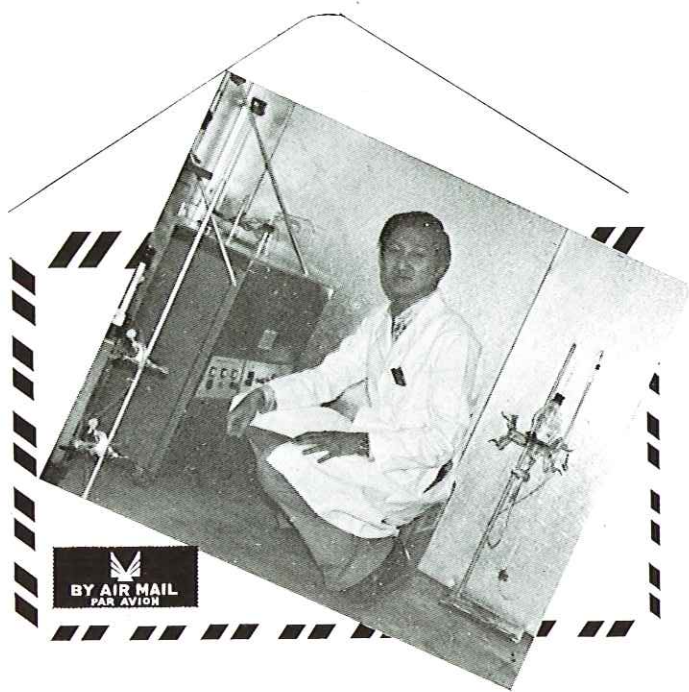

止。這時引力極大，把所有電子都擠到質子裏去，成了沒電荷的中子(neutron)，中子再被壓縮成一大核子，其比重竟大到每茶匙物質重十億噸，稱為「中子星」。

三、黑洞 偶爾體積龐大的星，物質會不停下陷，彷彿收縮到比重無限大的狀態。因比重太大，什麼都吐不出來，在它引力範圍都會被吸進去，連聲音、熱力或是光也是如此。我們稱它為「黑洞」。

黑洞從未有真正被發現過。但有些科學家相信神秘的半星體可能是黑洞存在的證據。它比我們的太陽大一百倍，光比我們整個銀河亮一百倍，也就是宇宙中最亮的光體。

有些天文學者認為黑洞的引力實在太強，將附近所有的星統統拖入黑洞，於是引力越來越強，大得能吞噬整個或部份星河，星河裏億萬顆星便放出所有的能，力求逃避捲入黑洞，整個星河為生死存亡而發出的熱能，可能就是龐大半星體的亮光來源。

無論如何，宇宙是神秘的。如「黑洞」這等概念實屬理論化的假設，其真確性尚有待證明。



## 星 的 演 化

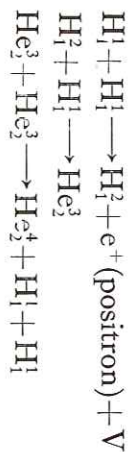
創世之際，已有無數原子粒子，它的來源是個謎，却是萬物之源。這包括帶陽極的質子（proton）和帶陰極的電子（electron）。兩者相吸引，電子便圍繞質子運行，就是最簡單的元素氫原子（hydrogen atom）。

氫原子多了，相相發出萬有引力，使它們不至消散，成為氣體雲。一顆星便開始成形。但還需這氣體雲够大。所謂大，就需縱橫十萬億哩，要比我們的太陽系大三千倍。

漸漸，引力加強，令氫原子緊縮起來。中心氣溫隨之升高，直至華氏十萬度，氫原子因互相猛烈碰撞而起新變化。再分為陽質子和陰電子。成為兩種氣體，稱「等離子區」。這現象維持大約一千萬年。

嗣後，其直徑只有一百萬哩。核心溫度升

至華氏二千萬度。熱核反應終於開始，質子因撞擊得太劇烈，竟然熔合成新元素「氦」原子核。其過程可以下列方程式表明：



核子熔合的火點燃之後，一顆星便誕生。中心核熱場爆炸而發出輻射與氣體壓力，剛好與吸進的引力相抵消。這正是我們太陽的階段。

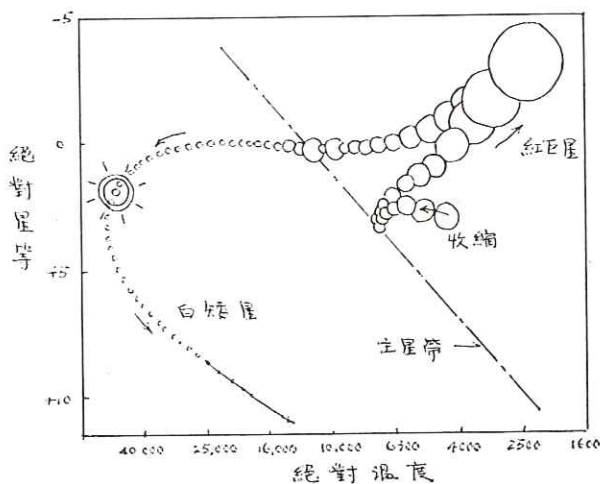
氮因較氫重，聚在星的中央，成為氮氣核心（helium core）。氫的熱核反應唯有在表面進行。但氮還未到其熱核反應的溫度，故無輻射壓力。到氮核心佔星的質量 10—15% 時，向內擠的萬有引力勝過一切向外的力，星急速受到壓力而縮細。溫度再次急劇增加，逼使氮產生熱核反應，外層便被輻射推離中心，於是表面溫度減低，星球呈現紅色，謂之紅巨星（Red Giant）。太陽將來也會變為紅巨星，估計它膨脹的外殼足可到達地球有餘。

氮的熱核反應產生了碳原子核。從此起，一顆星的盛衰便決定於它的大小。大的星，一再崩潰與重生，熔合成更重的元素。一旦到能產生鐵的時候，外向的輻射開始消失，作最後一次的崩潰。這令星中心的溫度高達一千億。各種

核子反應同時開始，很多比鐵重的元素因而誕生。星在最後崩潰時發生一次劇烈爆炸，使外層飛脫，成為行星狀星雲（planetary nebula）。剩下來核心之死亡繫於它本身的大小，它夭折的形式可分三種：

一、白矮星 核心繼續收縮，至與地球的大小相仿纔固定下來。它本身密度很大，而且熱度非常高，故呈現白色。

二、中子星 假如星的質量更大時，星要收縮至直徑只有一二十哩時才停

演出的時刻終於來臨了，演員們都誠惶誠恐，顯得有點兒緊張，所以成績當然不及排練時那般理想了。

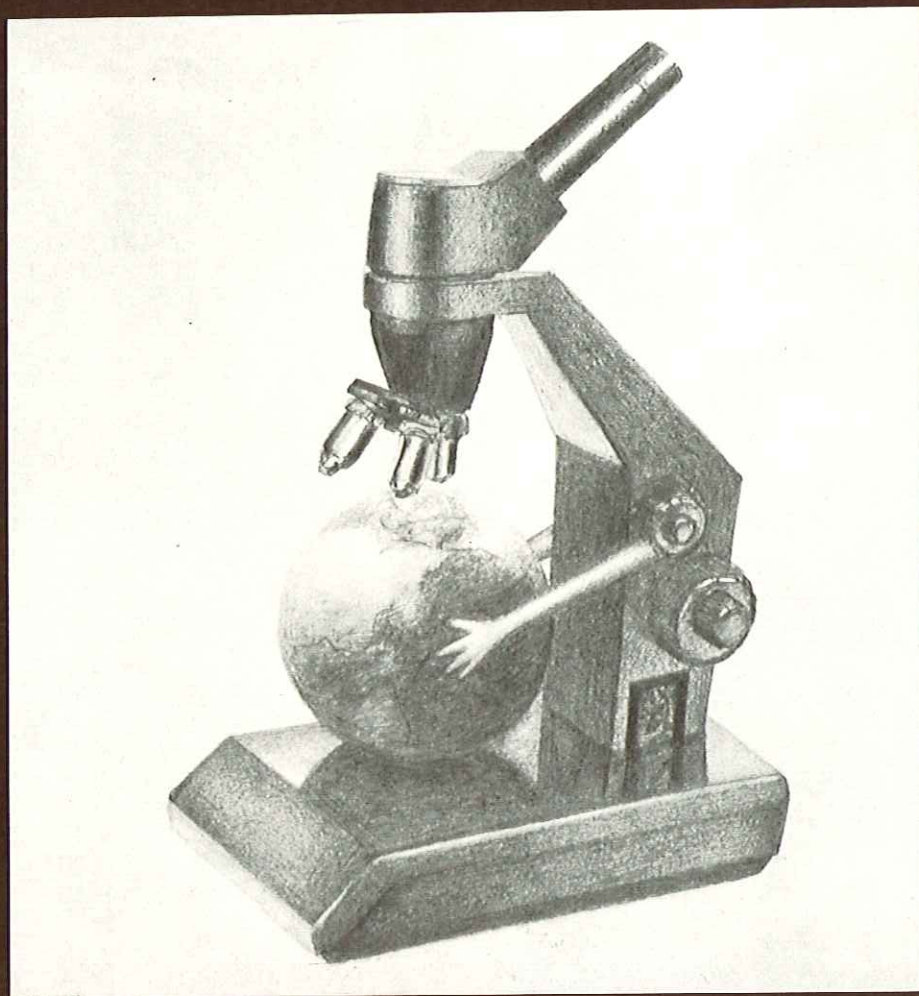

# 專稿

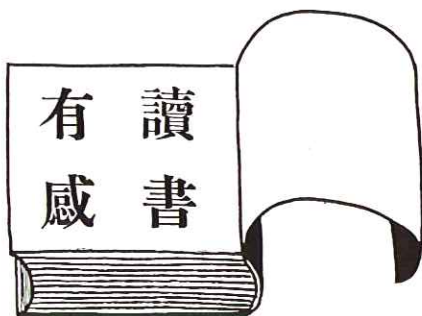

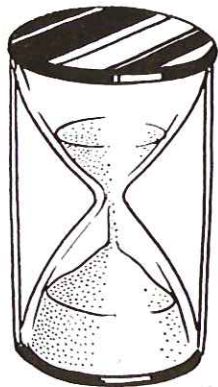

戰國時代之蘇秦，懸樑刺股，發憤忘食，無非不想將它浪費。這種人一生的成就，在於能夠驅使時間去努力工作，獲取了成功的果實而感到滿心欣慰，他們可算是世上最幸福的人。反過來說，大多數的人都只知貪圖眼前的享受，不懂得愛惜光陰，那裏能嚐到成功的滋味？這種人根本不知道時間為何物，只知道把時間當作金錢，任其揮霍，還不自知省悟。如果他們會認識到金錢歡樂乃肉體上一時的享受，而善於利用時間是導致精神上永恆的價值，他們即一分一毫也不容輕易放過。很明顯，時間的喪失在這種人心目中雖短暫間不覺得重要，但總有一天，他們一事無成的時候，便會知道時光之可貴，搖頭歎息，悵然不已。

一九七六年一月廿八日 天晴

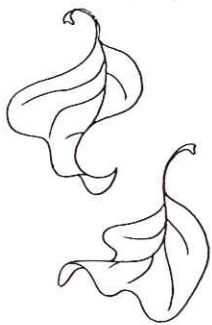

單是有內容，而質木無文的作品是會令讀者有一些枯燥乏味，缺乏美感的感受。因此描寫技巧對一篇文章的好壞有着一定的影響力。怎樣才可以令作品不致質木無文，呆滯而沒有生氣呢？這個又是非多閱讀不可，尤其是那些描寫出色，文筆細膩的作品，如紅樓夢、水滸傳、魯迅的狂人日記等，都是很有價值的參考典範。但在閱讀時我們不單祇在內容方面着眼，作者的寫作手法、觀點、感情和措辭技巧也應加倍注意。如是者經過一段長期的閱讀，你便會培養出一種分析能力，知道對那一類文章採取那種手法；對那種事物用那一種觀點；對那一類人應用那一種感情；對甚麼環境用甚麼辭藻。那時你也不愁你的作品不引起別人的共鳴了。

總括來說，要寫作得好就一定要多閱讀，所謂「一分耕耘，一分收穫」，你愈是閱讀得多，你的作品內容愈是豐富，描寫愈加精細。古語又云：「學而時習之。」因此單是靠閱讀，祇是成功了一半而矣。更要將從閱讀中學到的切實實的運用出來，這樣才可以達到完美的階段。所以我們要多動筆桿，如寫日記、週記和投稿等，這是最好的鍛鍊機會；或是在興之所至時，作一兩篇遊戲文章，把心中的快樂，臆隱的情懷

書在紙上，留待日後去回味一番，這也是人生的樂事。朋友，假如你不想把這種趣味拋却的話，請提起筆來，寫寫文章吧！

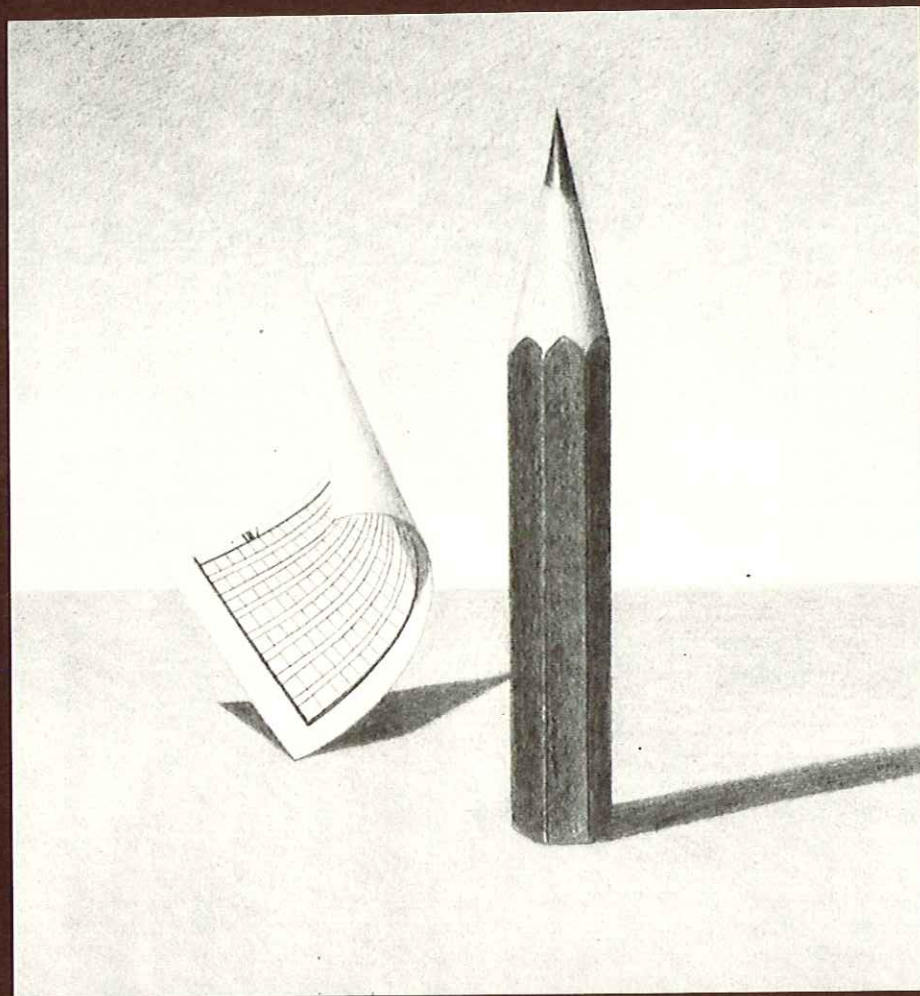
### 一個雨天的早上

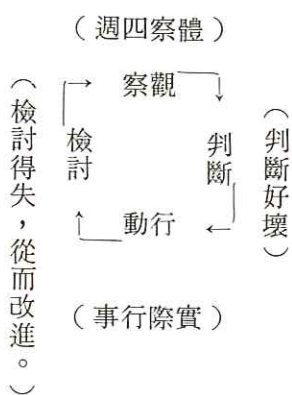


## 公教學生 青年運動
